Rotokare Scenic Reserve Trust is delighted to announce the arrival of our new General Manager, Dr. Bradley Schroder. Having worked in the tourism, conservation and wildlife industries for the past three decades, Bradley brings abundant knowledge and experience. Bradley has worked his way up in the conservation industry over several years and comes to Rotokare from his most recent position at Peace Parks Foundation, where he managed a 1.1 million-hectare Limpopo National Park in Mozambique. Alongside this, he has gained remarkable experience from his work in South Africa, Malawi, Botswana and Australia.

Bradley has already been getting stuck into mahi at the reserve but will be away for a couple of weeks running a marathon in Antarctica (in a 12kg Rhino suit, raising money for Rhino conservation, no less!)

Biodiversity



BATS

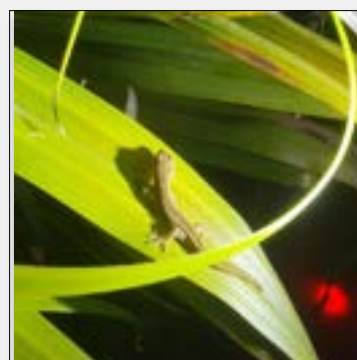
Over February Dave Bell organized a round of bat monitoring here at the reserve. 15 devices were deployed that detect the bats echolocation frequencies and count each “bat pass” in it’s vicinity. Over the course of 10 days, ~250 bat passes were recorded. The numbers were down on the previous survey, but not enough to be concerning—more likely to be attributed to sub-par weather!

HIHI

Another successful Hihi breeding season has flown by. The last active known nests (within nestboxes), are expected to fledge over the next 1-2 weeks. Mhairi is on site from the 6th-16th for the post-breeding survey and to catch as many unbanded chicks as possible, especially those that fledged from natural nests. It’s awesome to have such a high rate of natural nesting here at the Reserve, a tribute to habitat restoration here.



LIZARDS

Lizard monitoring continues with another round monitoring at artificial refuges across monitoring lines. Plenty of lizards were found, the usual suspects: Goldstripe geckos, Forest geckos, brown skinks, and ornate skinks. The team also had a treat by finding a few peripatus. Night time spotlight monitoring has been undertaken by an external contractor who found an abundance of goldstripes.

All monitored male kiwi have finished breeding for the season. Overall, there were 7 successful nests, with an estimated 11 eggs.

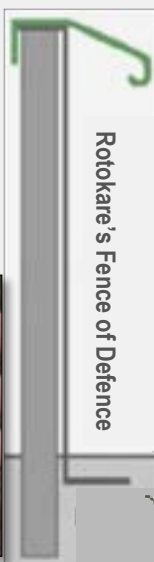

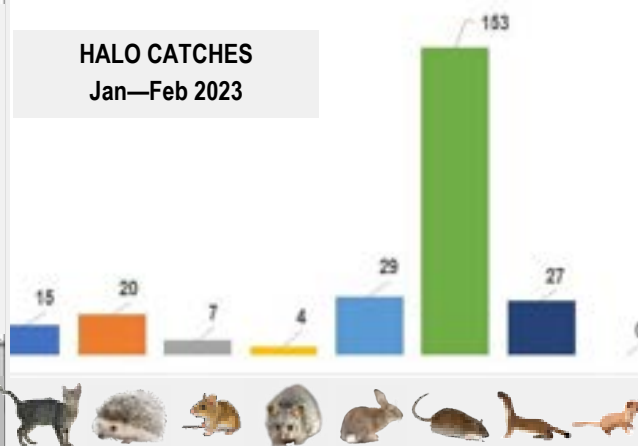
Biosecurity

The latest round of tracking card monitoring shows nothing but insects and geckos (and the occasional naughty bird!) running through our tracking cards. Another win for the Sanctuary, and reinforces that the hard work of volunteers & staff is continuing to protect the reserve’s integrity. In comparison cards deployed **outside** the reserve for Education have collected a lot of activity (pictures right). Putting into perspective the sanctity of the reserves pest-free status.
